

Federal News Agency (Федеральное Агентство Новостей, RIA FAN)	The biggest public media outlet created by Prigozhin, founded in May 2014. In February 2023, the Patriot media holding, which includes the Federal News Agency, came under EU sanctions for "spreading disinformation" about Russian 'special operation' in Ukraine. In the Russian Federation, it was banned under the sanctions of "Roskomnadzor". Now the main site is inaccessible.
"Patriot" media holding	The holding, headed by Yevgenii Prigozhin, included 16 media outlets. Nevskii Novosti, Politika Segodnia, Narodnye Novosti were the main outlets within the holding. Almost all media outlets were closed after Prigozhin's failed coup in June 2023.
USA Really	A Junk news website managed by Aleksandr Malkevich which was sponsored by the Russian Government, and which targeted American citizens. Fake news websites target the US audiences by using disinformation to create or inflame controversial topics such as the 2016 election. Not accessible after the dismantling of 'Patriot' media holding.
Popular Wagner-group-related Telegram channels	GREY ZONE (528,000 subscribers), Orkestr Vagnera (Оркестр Вагнера 675,000 subscribers), Razgruzka Vagnera (Разгрузка Вагнера 260,000 subscribers), and Кепка Prigozhina (Кепка Пригожина 387,000 subscribers). After the coup's failure and Prigozhin's death, most of the channels, including the most popular ones, remained active, but the frequency of posting and content diversity dropped significantly. Some channels continue to post war-related footage from Ukraine, news about Russian activities in Africa and generally are sources for researching the fate of former Wagner members.
Foundation for the Defence of National Values (Фонд защиты Национальных ценностей, FDNV)	The FDNV operates as the public relations arm of the Wagner Group. It promotes pro-Wagner Group propaganda and disinformation campaigns, including enhancing the reputation of the Wagner Group. It also worked as a 'think tank' specialising in international affairs.

New Media Development Fund (Фонд развития новых медиа)	A fund that was established by Malkevich in 2017 and is reportedly involved in funding his media activities in TOTs.
Miranda Media (Миранда Медиа)	The Internet provider of the Republic of Crimea and the federal city of Sevastopol, Luhansk and Donetsk.
MirTelecom (МирТелеком)	A part of the Miranda-Media company group, which was involved in laying new fibre-optic communication lines and modernization of mobile and fixed-line networks in the occupied parts of Kherson and Zaporizhia oblasts.
Tavria TV	A Russian television and radio company in Kherson Oblast that is one of the three largest Russian media outlets broadcasting in the Russian-occupied territories of Ukraine. Created under the supervision of Aleksandr Malkevich during the Summer of 2022 in Kherson (moved to Henichesk after the liberation). The website functions and is updated.
ZaMedia holding	Created in Zaporizhzhia oblast by Aleksandr Malkevich efforts in June-July 2022. Includes Za!TV channel, Za!Radio and Zaporozhskii Vestnik newspaper.
Mariupol 24	A TV channel which was established with the help of Malkevich in August 2022 as a branch of the Perviy Respublikanskyi TV Channel, which, in turn, is controlled by the Ministry of information of the so-called 'DNR'. Official broadcasting for Mariupol 24 commenced a few months later, in early November 2022.
Republican Media Holding (Республиканский Медиа Холдинг)	A media holding created in March 2017 in the so-called DNR under supervision of the Ministry of information of the unrecognised republic and encompassing 27 newspapers.
Regnum (Регнум)	A for-profit Russian-registered company, founded by Sergey Rudnov and including Donetsk News Agency, Luhansk Information Centre, Kherson News Agency, and Zaporizhzhia News Agency.
'Prodvizheniye' Agency (Агенство "Продвижение")	An advertising agency, linked to the Ministry of information of the so-called DNR.

Luganmedia (Луганьмедиа)	A media holding created in 2020 in the so-called LNR, including 14 regional media outlets.
State Television and Radio Broadcasting Company of The Lugansk People's Republic (ГТРК ЛНР)	A state unitary enterprise of the Ministry of Communications of the so-called LNR.
